Calif. high court halts gay nuptials

Mass. legislators are closer to ban

The California Supreme Court ordered an immediate halt to same-sex weddings in San Francisco on Thursday as Massachusetts lawmakers gave preliminary approval to a constitutional amendment to ban gay marriages in the only state where they have been ruled legal.

Teary-eyed couples were quickly turned away at San Francisco's City Hall, where 4,161 gay couples have tied the knot in the last month.

"We were filling out the application and they told us to stop," said Art Adams, who was the first to be denied as he and partner Devin Baker sought a license. "It's heartbreaking. I don't understand why two people in love should be prevented from expressing it."

On the other side of the country, Massachusetts legislators returned to the Capitol to consider a constitutional amendment that would strip gay couples of their court-granted right to marriage but allow civil unions.

The amendment won approval during two preliminary votes, but its final passage is far from certain. Gay marriage sup-

Obscure group takes responsibility, says strike on U.S. is nearly ready

A shadowy group claimed responsibility in the name of al-Qaida for a series of explosions Thursday that blew apart four commuter trains in Madrid, killing at least 192 people and wounding more than 1,400.

Spain at first blamed Basque separatists, but an Arabic newspaper said it had received a fivepage e-mail, signed by the Brigade of Abu Hafs al-Masri, claiming responsibility. The claim also said that a major attack against America was "90 percent ready.

Hours after the attack, Spanish officials announced the discovery of new evidence that they said left open the possibility that Islamic fundamentalists were involved.

The e-mail claim was received at Al-Quds al-Arabi's London offices. It said the brigade's "death squad" had penetrated "one of the pillars of the crusade alliance, Spain," and carried out what it called **Operation Death Trains.**

"This is part of settling old accounts with Spain, the crusader, and America's ally in its war against Islam," the claim said. The statement warned the

While Puerto Peñasco, about four hours from Tucson, welcomes college vacationers, Parra Elias was a bit unnerved to learn of a convergence of spring breaks that could dramatically swell the number of revelers visiting the beach town.

All three Arizona universities, some California schools like San Diego State University, and Colorado colleges have spring break at the same time this year.

The U.S. Consulate estimates about 20,000 people went to Rocky Point last year, about a quarter of the partyers expected this year.
