U.S. Magistrate Judge Gary Sebelius ordered Grimmett detained just two weeks after Shawnee County District Judge Franklin Theis had placed him on probation for a sodomy conviction in state court. Grimmett pleaded no contest on March 14, 2003, to sexually assaulting a 6-year-old boy.

Theis sentenced Grimmett on Feb. 27 to nine years and nine months in prison for the sodomy conviction, then suspended the prison term and placed him on probation for the same amount of time with a number of conditions.
