

## **Bombings kill** more than 190 in Spain's capital

MADRID, Spain — More than 190 people were killed and at least 1,200 were injured when terrorist bombs ripped through trains during the Spanish capital's morning rush hour Thursday.

It was the bloodiest such attack in Spain's history.

Government officials quickly attributed the bombings, three days before national elections, to the Basque separatist group ETA, which has waged a bloody 40-year campaign for independence.

A letter to an Arabic-language newspaper in London claimed the attacks were carried

## American accused of spying for Iraq

WASHINGTON — A distant cousin of White House chief of staff Andrew Card was charged Thursday with working for the Iraqi Intelligence Service.

Susan Lindauer, 41, was charged with accepting \$10,000 for her work with the Iraqi Intelligence Service, according to a federal indictment unsealed in U.S. District Court in New York City on Thursday.

Card turned her in to the FBI for contacting him in the weeks before the war allegedly on behalf of Saddam Hussein's regime.



Arson investigators generally use the following techniques when looking into a suspicious fire:

- Check the outside and inside of the structure to check for fire damage. The area with the most damage usually is the point of origin.
- Use of dogs, trained to work around physical obstacles and discriminate scents of various accelerants used to start fires.
- Take photographs of the scene and the damage Sift through debris for evidence and clues.
- Collect samples to be shipped to a lab for processing. Sensitive lab equipment can help determine what started a fire.
- Interview any witnesses.

## Gay marriages hit legal wall

SAN FRANCISCO — The California Supreme Court on Thursday ordered an immediate halt to gay marriages in San Francisco.

The court did not rule on the legality of gay marriages. Justices indicated they would

decide in the coming months whether San Francisco's mayor has the authority to allow the weddings, which conservatives have fought to block.

In Massachusetts, state lawmakers reconvened Thursday to consider a ban on gay marriage. They gave preliminary approval to a proposal that would ban gay marriage but allow civil unions.

Massachusetts' highest court ruled in November that it is unconstitutional to prevent gays from marrying — a ruling that sparked a legislative scramble to amend the state constitution.

#### THE MISSOURI DEPARTMENT

**OF TRANSPORTATION** will be slimming down a section of Interstate 70 between Interstate 470 and Missouri 7 for massive highway reconstruction. The Department of Transportation will restrict traffic to two eastbound lanes and two westbound lanes.

The department is aiming to redo the 5-mile stretch of highway from the bottom up. Because the reconstructed highway will have a lifespan of 35 years, officials are promising no more potholes for a long time.





#### AT THE TRIANGLE,

Department of Transportation road crews will build nine new bridges and remove 11 old ones. Additionally, the department plans to open new northbound lanes at Interstate 435.

#### IN CASS COUNTY,

crews will remove the asphalt from U.S. 71 and replace it with upgraded materials. The 121/2 miles of work will stretch from the Jackson-Cass county line to Missouri 291 near Harrisonville.

## Nonprofits try out for-profit enterprises

Many area nonprofit agencies are putting out the word: They are open for business.

Yes, for-profit business.

Squeezed by the recent recession, and under greater financial scrutiny by potential donors, nonprofit organizations are trying to determine how to bring in money outside of charitable appeals while not losing sight of their nonprofit missions.

At the YWCA in downtown Kansas City, Kan., money is beginning to trickle in at a coffee shop on its premises, owned and operated as part of the YWCA's mission.

At the Rehabilitation Institute, trainee/employees are working at a business set up within the Kansas City facility to scan corporate documents onto computer disks.

#### First glance

- Major funders urge nonprofit agencies to "be entrepreneurial" to operate efficiently and to find ways to generate earned income.
- Some area nonprofits are starting money-making ventures, but revenue covers only small fractions of their operating expenses.

At the Women's Employment Network, staff members are taking their work-readiness training expertise into the paying, corporate market.

The three enterprises are among a growing number of income-producing ventures launched or under study by area nonprofit agencies.
