The sharply contested presidential race is expected to spur record attendance at the Washoe County Democratic Party Convention this weekend, while county Republicans convene to plot a way to deliver Nevada's electoral votes to President Bush.

Both parties have scheduled their county conventions for Saturday at different Reno hotel-casinos, where delegates will debate platform issues and elect delegates to the state political conventions next month.

## Suspects include separatists, group linked to al-Qaida

MADRID, Spain — A series of bombs hidden in backpacks exploded in quick succession Thursday, blowing apart four commuter trains and killing at least 198 people and wounding more than 1,400. Spain at first blamed Basque separatists but a shadowy group claimed re-sponsibility in the name of al-Qaida for the worst terrorist attack in Spanish history

Panicked rush-hour commuters trampled on each other, abandoning their bags and shoes, after the first three bombs went off in one train in the Atocha station in the heart of Madrid. Seven other bombings followed on other trains.

Train cars were turned into twisted wrecks and platforms were strewn with corpses. Cell phones rang unanswered on the bodies of the dead as frantic relatives tried to call them.

March 11, 2004, now holds its place in the history of infamy," Prime Minister Jose Maria Aznar said.

The bombings came three days ahead of Spain's general election on Sunday. A major campaign issue was how to deal with ETA, the Basque militant group that is seeking greater autonomy.

## President unleashes TV attacks on Kerry

WASHINGTON - President Bush's re-election campaign began a broadcast critique of Massachusetts U.S. Sen. John Kerry by name on Thursday, an unusually rare tactic at this time in a presidential race.

New television ads claim Kerry wants to raise taxes and would weaken the war against terrorism.

'John Kerry: Wrong on taxes. Wrong on defense," says one ad. Kerry, it says, wanted to delay "defending America" until the United Nationsapproved. It also says Kerry wants to change the USA Patriot Act, which gives the government broad powers to investigate suspected terrorists. Theads are running in 18 states expected to be competitive in November.

Kerry spokesman David Wade said Kerry repeatedly has said "we never need permission from the U.N. to go to war." Kerry's advisers said he wants to add privacy protections to the Patriot Act.

A second ad does not mention Kerry by name but says Americans face a choice between going forward "with confidence, resolve and hope" or the "dangerous illusion that terrorists are not plotting and outlaw regimes are no threat."
